Pau Casals (1876 – 1973), speaking in his native Catalan, said at the United Nations on being awarded the UN Peace Medal on 24 October 1971 at the age of 95:

I have not played the cello in public for many years, but I feel that the time has come to play again. I am going to play a melody from Catalan folklore: El cant dels ocells – The Song of the Birds. Birds sing when they are in the sky, they sing: "Peace, Peace, Peace", and it is a melody that Bach, Beethoven and all the greats would have admired and loved. What is more, it is born in the soul of my people, Catalonia.

Emily Hoile

A harpist with 'breathtaking skills' (BBC Radio 2), Emily Hoile, a native of the North East, is currently studying at The Juilliard School, New York, with principal harpist of the New York Philharmonic, Nancy Allen. Previously she studied at St Mary's Music School, Edinburgh with Catriona McKay and Helen MacLeod.

Recently, Emily was the 2nd prize winner at the Cité des Arts International Harp Competition, Paris, as well as being the Young Artist in Residence at the Lammermuir Festival 2011. Other festival appearances include the BBC Proms, Edinburgh International Harp Festival, Juilliard 'Focus' Festival, Carnegie Hall's 'JapanNYC', and she was selected to represent Britain to perform in the Tenth World Harp Congress in Amsterdam. She has won numerous awards, including the Edinburgh Competition Festival's Concerto Competition, Traves Trophy for her Half Hour Recital, as well as St Mary's Music School's Directors' Recital Prize and Mozart Concerto Competition.

Emily has performed with many ensembles including the Juilliard Orchestra and the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain with whom she was principal harp, and the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland. Highlights include performing in Carnegie Hall, New York, conducted by John Adams, as well as performing in the Royal Festival Hall, London, in their production of Bernstein's Mass with Marin Alsop. As a passionate performer of new music, Emily has played with both of Juilliard's contemporary music groups, the New Juilliard Ensemble and AXIOM with whom she toured to Finland in August 2013.

Donald Robinson

Donald Robinson was born in Glasgow in 1996 and started playing the cello and piano at the age of nine. In 2009 he gained a place at the Music School of Douglas Academy where he studied cello with Rudi de Groote.

In 2012 Donald won all the major string/cello prizes at the Glasgow Music Festival and received the Ailie Cullen Memorial Prize for the most outstanding performance of the Festival. He is a member of the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland.

In July this year he made his concerto debut with NYOS Juniors at Perth Concert Hall with a performance of the Saint Saens Cello Concerto Number 1 in A minor. He has attended master classes at the Kronberg Academy and courses with cellists Alexander Baillie and Karine Georgian.

Donald has a keen interest in composition and has written the story and music for a short ballet, The Nightingale That Never Sang. Donald currently studies with Professor Alexander Baillie at the Hochschule für Kunste, Bremen.

Robson's Choice

Robson's Choice was founded 13 years ago at Jane Robson's Northumbrian piping class. Since then they have gained a number of new members, including a guitarist and a fiddler, making a full group of 15 musicians. The band specialises in playing traditional music, performing everything from lyrical slow airs to foot-tapping jigs.

The group is dedicated to raising money for St Oswald's Hospice. Louise Woodman, a founder member of the group, from Stannington, said "We get together to play mainly because we enjoy making music together, but knowing that we are raising money for such a well respected and well known cause gives us a focus and brings an extra meaning to our music."
